Institutional Context

About Virginia Commonwealth University (VCU)



About VCU

- Urban, public 4-year university
 - Total enrollment = 28,408
- Carnegie R1 Institution
- Top 50 (NSF) Research
 Expenditures
- Student Level
 - 75% undergraduate
 - 15% graduate
 - 10% first professional





About VCU


- Gender → 64% female, 35% male, <1% other
- Underrepresented Minority → 33%
- First Generation → 24%
- Pell Grant recipients → ~30%






Is students' level of extraversion and their level of involvement on campus associated with their relational/social sense of belonging?





- More engagement with peers and outside of the classroom indicated more connection to the university (Zhoc, et al., 2019)
- Students engaged 10+ hours per week outside the classroom had higher ratings of belonging (Knifsend, 2020)





- Moderate positive association (Malone, et al., 2012)
- First-year students who were higher on extraversion reported higher social engagement and belonging during their sophomore and senior years (Harris, et al., 2017)



Research Questions

- Is students' level of extraversion and their level of involvement on campus associated with their relational/social sense of belonging?
 - Are involved students self-reporting higher extraversion?
 - Are involved students self-reporting higher sense of belonging?



Study Design and Sample

In Fall 2021, we conducted an involvement study in order to get a better idea of student involvement in campus activities and student organizations.

Random sample:

- 5,000 undergraduates, 2,000 graduate/professional
- 688 total responses (10% response rate)
 - 67% undergraduate, 31% graduate/professional

Total of 389 complete observations used in the final model.



Study - Respondents

- Gender
 - 70% female, 26% male, 4% non-binary, trans, genderqueer/nonconforming
- Underrepresented Minority (URM) 38%
- First generation status 23%
- Working status
 - 61% working for pay
 - 39% not working



Key Variables

- Predictors:
 - Extraversion (sum score ranging from -10 to +10) Mini International Personality Item Pool (Extraversion). Average sum score = -0.56
 - I am the life of the party.
 - I don't talk a lot. (RC)
 - I talk to a lot of different people at parties.
 - I keep in the background. (RC)



Key Variables

- Predictors:
 - Extraversion (sum score ranging from -10 to +10) Mini International Personality Item Pool (Extraversion). Average sum score = -0.56
 - Campus Involvement (not involved vs. involved)
 - Campus activities/events
 - Student groups/orgs, Greek life
 - Both

56% involved



Key Variables

- Predictors:
 - Extraversion (sum score ranging from -10 to +10) Mini International Personality Item Pool (Extraversion). Average sum score = -0.56
 - Campus Involvement (not involved vs. involved)
- Dependent Variable: Sense of Belonging

Average Score across 3 items (6-point scale) – 4.47

- I have developed personal relationships with other students at VCU.
- Someone at VCU cares about my success.
- I have found a social circle at VCU where I truly fit in.

Sense of Belonging = Belonging in Peer Relationships & Support



Research Questions

- Is students' level of extraversion and their level of involvement on campus associated with their relational/social sense of belonging?
 - Are involved students self-reporting higher extraversion? No.
 - Are involved students self-reporting higher sense of belonging?

Yes, involved students report higher relational/social sense of belonging.






Involved students report higher relational/social sense of belonging.



















Students who are not involved and rate themselves higher on extraversion also rate themselves higher on belonging in peer relationships and support.









Students who are involved and rate themselves higher on extraversion also rate themselves higher on belonging in peer relationships and support.



Considerations

- Campus Activity/Event Design:
 - Events/activities might draw a more extraverted crowd. How can we reach students who are more introverted?
 - Are our campus activities/events drawing more URM students in particular?
- Measurement of Sense of Belonging
- Institution-level factors
